Highlights of Class XIII included herding cattle on Kuahiwi Ranch and working in a taro loi on Maui. The class learned about mushrooms, pigs, vanilla, chickens, salt, bees, pineapple, lavender, tropical fruit, wine and coffee. Community projects were inspiring on every island. Cutting edge technology was demonstrated with renewable energy, genetic modification and aquaponics systems. School gardens and tropical flowers shipped around the world showed the awesome diversity of this industry.

Strategic Planning and Facilitation workshops demonstrated tools and taught skills that were practiced throughout the program. Conversations with business and community leaders on each island, in our state legislature and with our national congressional delegation demonstrated clearly what works -and what doesn't.

Camp outs in Kokee on Kauai and Hakalau on Hawaii bonded friendships and deepened connections to this special chain of islands in the middle of the Pacific. The diversity of Class XIII was a distinctive feature and provided a unique opportunity for learning and systems thinking around some tough agricultural issues.

The Agricultural Leadership Program is an experience of a lifetime; an experience that teaches one important skills to better lead businesses and communities; it provides opportunities to not only learn but to understand the intricate linkages that contribute to challenging issues in the agriculture sector and some ways to deal with them. And most importantly the program introduces one to a network of committed leaders from across the state representing every aspect of the sector.
